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A Year of Hope

During the Christmas period of 2024 and at the New Year of 2025, Pope Francis formally opened a number of Holy Doors in each of the Major Basilicas and a prison. The solemn opening of these doors was an introduction to this Year of Jubilee. The solemn opening of the doors is an invitation to enter the sacred space within and in this Jubilee Year to find reasons for hope. Given the tragic state of the world at the present time, reasons for finding hope are truly necessary. The fragile ceasefire in Gaza is one such sign. But it is so fragile that many are holding their breath, as anything could break the truce and violence on a catastrophic scale could break out again.

The Pope reminds us that the concept of a Jubilee Year was developed in ancient Judaism. It was a year when slaves were freed, debts were written off, it was a year of freedom and reconciliation. This tradition was introduced many centuries ago into the Church. It became a year of reconciliation and penance and forgiveness and was celebrated as a Holy Year every twenty-five years.

In an elaborate discourse, Pope Francis outlines the need for hope in the lives of all. People are called to be signs of hope for others. "During the Holy Year we are called to be signs of hope for those of our brothers and sisters who experience hardship of any kind." He singles out prisoners, the sick and the disabled, young people without hope, migrants, the elderly, (especially grandparents), and especially the poor. "I ask with all my heart that hope be granted to the billions of the poor, who often lack the essential of life. Before the constant tide of new forms of impoverishment, we can easily grow inured or resigned. ... Each day we meet people who are poor or impoverished; they may even be our next-door neighbours. Often, they are homeless or lack sufficient food for the day. They suffer from exclusion and indifference on the part of the many."

This paragraph reminds us that in your work for those living in poverty who come to St. Vincent de Paul for help, you are signs of hope. "We are also reminded that we are signs of hope not for some simple philanthropic vision, but because, as Christians, our Christian life is lived out in faith, hope and charity. These are divine gifts flowing from the never-ending love poured out on us by God, won for us by the life and death of Christ, poured into our lives to be shared with our needy brothers and sisters."

A final word from Pope Francis: -

"We aspire to happiness that is definitely found in the one thing that can bring us fulfilment, which is love. ... I will live forever in the love that does not disappoint, the love from which nothing can ever separate me. Let us listen again to the words of the Apostle: 'I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor heights, nor depths, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus Our Lord."










GDPR

What does GDPR mean to the work I do for SVP?





GDPR – The General Data Protection Regulation

GDPR is an EU Regulation that came into law in May 2018. All organisations must comply with the 7 Principles of GDPR.

The purpose of this guide is to provide practical guidelines for members and volunteers to manage the personal data of the people they are assisting in a GDPR compliant manner.

Members and volunteers who gather and process personal data are doing so on behalf of SVP and must comply with SVP's data management procedures in order to avoid breaches of the legislation.

Being compliant with the regulation will protect the people the Society serves as well as the reputation of the Society.

The personal data which SVP processes relates to the clients, staff, members and their families, as well as visitors to SVP premises and those who provide services to SVP.

The guide outlines further information for handling personal information, what to do with Conference minutes, how to safely store and retain records.

SVP Safeguarding in Home Visitation

- Northern Region

SVP is committed to creating a safe, healthy and inclusive environment for everyone we assist, particularly the children, young people and adults at risk/in need of protection.

SVP home visitation members have a vital role in helping vulnerable groups in the community.



What is safeguarding?

Safeguarding is preventative action to ensure the safety and wellbeing of children and adults at risk/adults in need of protection. Safeguarding is an essential part of quality home visitation. It also provides information in case an SVP member comes across a concern.

Who is a child?

A child is any person under the age of 18.

Who is an adult at risk?

In Northern Ireland an 'adult at risk of harm' is a person aged 18 or over whose exposure to harm through abuse, exploitation or neglect may be increased by their (a) personal circumstances, and/or (b) life circumstances.

Who is an adult in need of protection?

An 'adult in need of protection' is a person aged 18 or over whose exposure to harm through abuse, exploitation or neglect may be increased by their (a) personal circumstances, and/or (b) life circumstances, and (c) who is unable to protect their own wellbeing, property, assets, rights or other interests.

What is abuse?

Abuse is a single or repeated act, or lack of appropriate action, occurring within any relationship where there is an expectation of trust, which causes harm or distress to another individual or violates their human or civil rights.

What are these types of abuse?

- Physical
- Emotional
- Sexual
- Financial
- Exploitation
- Neglect
- Institutional

What can SVP members do if they have concerns about abuse?

It is important that everyone in SVP is aware that the person who first encounters a case of alleged abuse is not responsible for deciding whether or not actual abuse has occurred.

SVP's role is not to investigate or form our own conclusions but to follow the SVP Safeguarding Policy – record, report and seek advice.

SVP Safeguarding Reporting

Concern Arises

Concern may arise from

- → A disclosure of harm or abuse
- → An observed incident of harm or abuse
- → A suspicion of harm or abuse

Action

- → Ensure the **safety** of the child/adult that you have a concern about.
- → If the person is in **immediate danger** report to the Health Trust or Police as appropriate.
- → Record your concern in writing and report to the Designated Liaison Person without delay.
- → Maintain **confidentiality** at all times.

The Role of an Area President

What is the Purpose of an Area President?

An Area President provides support and guidance to the Regional President and Conferences in quality Home Visitation and all other activities, in accordance with the ethos and vision of the Society. An Area President is part of the Regional Council which is the decision making body of the Region.

An Area President should be:

- A member of a Conference for a minimum of two years
- Willing to step down from officer role of own Conference
- Willing to visit Conferences regularly

An Area President should:

- Embrace and promote the ethos of the Society
- Have good leadership skills
- Have good communication skills





Castlederg is my hometown and caring for people in my local area drew me to join SVP.

I joined SVP in March 2020 and I am affiliated to St Patrick's Castlederg Conference.

Previously I had been involved in voluntary projects that took me to Fagaras in Romania; Knock, County Mayo; and Dublin; but this was different.






Speaking about the annual Members' Day, Mary Waide, SVP Regional President for the Northern Region, said:



Looking back, now that I'm older, I realise that the men in the Conference maybe weren't that old at the time after all!

John says that there were no women in the Conference when he joined 55 years ago and that his biggest achievement has been visiting Magilligan on Sundays – as it is "such a worthy cause and a great experience".

When asked about the importance of the Annual Appeal, John said: "Seeing the joy on the faces of the families we help at Christmas. I remember delivering a beautifully decorated hamper and the childrens' faces lighting up as they stood behind their mother at the door when we arrived. They could never have afforded a hamper like it and it really epitomised the Christmas spirit." His biggest challenge he says has been: "Keeping up with the demand of such great need. There are so many people on benefits and it's just so difficult for people nowadays.

Recruitment of new members is a priority and John added: "I placed information in the Parish bulletin and then our Parish Priest spoke at Mass. As a result we got eight new members – seven ladies and one gent! This has been a great boost as we lost so many members who didn't return after Covid."

Speaking of the future, John said: "I think we need to consider how to encourage young people to join. The pressure is so great, especially with so many single parent families who are in need of our support."

You touch, support and change lives for the better, without judgement or sanction, and the fact that your only criterion is need – is truly humbling. The dignity and respect that you afford to every individual, regardless of race, religion or creed allows us to know that empathy and compassion are not, in fact, luxuries but necessities. The range and scope of the work you do is clear



evidence that we should never underestimate the power of local volunteers, of all ages, delivering for local people.

It is clear that difficulties inspire and do not discourage you. Your work is the work of courage, of hope, the work of love.

The difference between hope and despair, is the difference in how the story is told. Hope, respect, dignity and social justice are simply the iteration of a passion for what is possible. And they happen when people, like you, care enough to make a difference.

St. Vincent de Paul wrote 'Charity is the cement that binds communities to God and people to one another'. I thank God for the work of this remarkable charity and its outstanding volunteers. I am honoured to present you with The King's Award for Voluntary Service."

ANNUAL APPEAL

The Annual Appeal launched in early November with the hard hitting theme that, although it can be the most wonderful time of the year, for some families at this time of year they wonder whether they will have Christmas at all.



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Calls for assistance were expected to continue to rise due to the crippling increased costs associated with day to day living.

Launching the Annual Appeal in the 180th anniversary year of SVP in Ireland, SVP Regional President for the Northern Region, Mary Waide, said that the Society was focused on providing help to those in our local community needing support, as they wonder whether they will be able to provide a happy Christmas for their families. Mary said: "Requests for help from families faced with impossible choices across the Region sadly continue to increase. We are recording on average 200 calls per day to our Regional Office in Belfast and we have helplines operating throughout the Region where direct calls to our members can rise to anything between 500 and 1,000 a week in winter. People are desperate. They are wondering how they will provide for their loved ones this Christmas and the most popular of the requests we receive are for help with food and energy. That's before they decorate a tree or place a gift underneath it."

"Our theme, 'The Wonder of Christmas', reflects the questions our volunteers face most regularly in the run up to Christmas; I wonder will I have enough to buy food for the Christmas dinner? I wonder if I will be able to keep the house warm? I wonder if I will be able to afford to buy a toy from the Santa list? I wonder do the kids know we are struggling? I wonder if SVP can help?"



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Mary added: "SVP members visit homes all year round where people are continually trying to meet basic family expenses every day but affording these expenses typically seems to cause more worry at special occasions such as Christmas. Those hardest hit include a range of households with varying circumstances including those dependent on benefits; one-parent families; low-income workers; lowincome households in rural areas; people with disabilities and their carers. That is why we are seeking donations in the form of vouchers to give people the gift of choice and help families pay for food, heat their homes and ensure their children wake up to a magical Christmas."





What I Believe

As time passes you realise that God only gives you what you can handle.



Tell me about your background.

I was born into a very happy and vibrant family with my parents Paddy and Pat and siblings Caroline, Brian, Marion, and Aileen. I was the baby of the house. My memories are filled with happiness, music and laughter, and we were all so blessed to be reared by parents who gave everything they had to make our lives better. and offer us more opportunities than maybe they had enjoyed. I loved primary school at Saint Patrick's in Donaghmore and went on to study for GCSEs and A-levels. In later years I gained a teaching diploma in Music and am currently studying for a degree in Theology. I have worked now for over 20 years in the music and media sector and continue to enjoy the opportunities and experiences the self-employed world presents.

How and when did you come to faith?

I remember travelling with the family together for Mass each Sunday and we would have prayed the Rosary weekly as a family at home. As I got a little older I was an altar server and even at that tender age gaining an awareness of the importance of the Sacraments. At one stage I thought of becoming a priest.

Have you ever had a crisis or a gnawing doubt about your faith?

My moments of doubt strangely came when I was at the height of my career and maybe not doubt but apathy, which is maybe worse. I was living a life full of opportunities, and excitement and everything on the outside seemed to be perfect but I soon realised however, that I was missing something and that was my relationship with God. I had forgotten that most important companion on the journey of Life.

Pain, suffering or loss have a powerful way of grounding you and reconnecting you with the important things. The darkest and hardest times in our life journey are also the moments when we feel God close. Without faith I would find those moments much harder to work through.

Could you envisage a life without faith?

No. Faith is central to my life, and daily prayer and weekly Mass are two things which my wife Claire and I hold firm. I have been so honoured to sing at those moments in people's lives like marriage, death and healing when they need the inspiration of their church and faith.

Is there a difference between being spiritual and being religious?

They go together.

Are you ever frustrated by your own faith or denomination?

On occasion but no church is perfect. They are led by human beings and every person has flaws. I am saddened at the decline in vocations and we have been guilty of taking our ordained for granted at times, but this too seems to be a challenge for many churches.

Can you look beyond death?

I believe in the Resurrection so I do not fear death. We will be reunited with God and with the many souls who have departed this life. Like most people I have made many mistakes, but I do try to live in a way that hopefully will gain me an entry to Heaven.

Is your faith fulfilling its mission?

I have been honoured to share music and hymns through teaching at schools. They too have the joy in their hearts that I remember from when I was young. This is in some way fulfilling my mission.

Have you ever experienced a "leap of faith moment?"

Yes, when I was younger I wanted to be a Religion teacher. However my life took a different path. I hope that by 2025 I will have graduated in Theology and I am excited for what lies ahead.

Why are so many people turning their backs on organised religion?

They have been disillusioned by the many scandals that have rocked our Church, and many don't feel it is relevant. I hear people saying that it is boring and antiquated and they simply feel they don't need it in an ever-secular world.

How is faith portrayed in the media?

Not nearly fairly enough. I see people of faith doing incredible work all the time, ordained and lay people continue to help the sick, the poor and the marginalised every single day. The media rarely seem to highlight any of this great work that is grounded in Love for one another.

Have you ever been angry with God?

Not angry, but disappointed at times. I have hopes and desires, and have experienced times of pain and struggle. Often it seems that your prayers go unanswered. As time passes you realise that God only gives you what you can handle and always gives you what you need as Garth Brooks put it, 'Some of God's greatest gifts are unanswered prayers'.

Have you a favourite hymn/ spiritual song?

How Great Thou Art is my all-time favourite. I adore singing this and when the congregation join in it brings me to a very deeply emotional place.

Is there a religious text from which you derive comfort?

I love the story of The Road to Emmaus. It reminds me that we never know when we might encounter the living Christ, and our hearts and eyes must be open to recognising him.

What happens after death?

We will meet God face to face, and there will be a judgement. If we have lived lives worthy to be with Him we will enter into the Kingdom of Heaven and be reunited with the many who have gone before us.

Has religion helped or hindered in Northern Ireland?

For the most part religion has helped. So many times our churches have had to pick up the pieces in very difficult, traumatic occasions and try and rebuild the fractured pieces of people's lives. I am saddened that there have been times when hate has been preached, and division flourished from that, but the Christian message is love of neighbour and at times some preachers forgot that.

Where do you feel closest to God?

Singing in church. There is such a deep connection that I cannot explain, but I feel it so personally.

Some personal preferences?

Book: *The Man in White* by Johnny Cash which tells of his love of Saint Paul. Film: *The Green Mile*; Music; I always return to Joni Mitchell's *Both Sides Now*.

How would you like to be remembered?

As someone who tried to do their best, who failed and tried again.

Do you believe in regrets?

Yes. Regrets are important to help us grow. If we have no regrets then we've done absolutely nothing wrong... I'd like to meet that person.





Social Justice – A Key Cornerstone Of Our Work

In his encyclical, Laudato Si, Pope Francis calls to mind a practice from the Old Testament where farmers were encouraged not to harvest their fields right up to the edges and not to collect any produce that they missed while harvesting, but to leave the margins and the gleanings for the poor and the stranger to collect what they needed to survive.

In SVP we are a people who stand in the margins to ensure that there is enough and very often where the margins are very tight and there is insufficient for people to survive, we have to be the margins to ensure that there is food and heat where there is scarcity.

At times like this we have to hold Government to account and remind them of their responsibility to ensure that all citizens are taken care of and hold them to account when suffering becomes the norm, rather than the exception.

As Vincentians, we are about the business of relieving suffering caused by poverty. In our visits, we need to respond justly to people and in turn seek justice on the wider stage. Our founder, Blessed Frédéric Ozanam states our calling very clearly when he says: "The question which is agitating the world today is a social one. It is a struggle between those who have nothing and those who have too much. Our duty as Christians is to throw ourselves between those two camps, in order to accomplish by love, what justice alone cannot do."

Gerardine Cunningham Chair, Northern Region Social Justice Group Much has changed since the publication of 'Beyond Breaking Point: Sharing the perspective of SVP Members on the cost of living crisis' in November 2023. This was a groundbreaking report for SVP Northern Region, for the first time sharing research on the experience SVP members gain through visitation.

The report offered unique insights into the reality and hardships of the people we assist across a wide variety of themes – reflecting on the realities of poor housing standards, inadequate mental health supports, through to navigating complex social welfare systems.

A New Executive and Opportunity For Action

In 2024, the most significant development of the year was undoubtedly the restoration of the Northern Ireland Executive. We can now hope to see the impact of political leadership on the lives of people living in poverty.

In 'Beyond Breaking Point', the restoration of the Executive was a key recommendation as a fundamental enabling factor to create the strategies and policies needed to bring about real change.

We now hope the restored Executive will lead to progress on some of the specific changes we called for in our report, which were based on the experience of SVP members.

Poverty Now Rising¹

In a concerning development, data was published in 2024 by the Department for Communities showing many poverty indicators are now increasing.

Overall, the proportion of people living in poverty (relative poverty, before housing costs) rose from 16% in 2021/22 to 18% in 2022/2023 (the most recent data).

For children, this increase was even more stark. Whilst 18% of children were in poverty (relative poverty, before housing costs) in 2021/2022, the following year this had increased to 24%.

The proportion of children who were both living on a low income, and who had experienced material deprivation (going without essential goods and services) also increased – rising from 7% to 9% of children.

Poverty rates, measured both before and after housing costs, rose dramatically for social and private renters between 2021/22 and 2022/2023.

These rising rates of poverty are a worrying change from the downward trend of recent years._

At SVP, we see the real-life face of these statistics, with people struggling to keep up with the cost of living and having to make their money go further to cover the weekly essentials.

In 2025, we will continue to use our voice to call for the changes needed to bring poverty rates down.

Making Our Voice Heard

In 2024, SVP drew on the views and experiences of SVP members from 'Beyond Breaking Point' to respond to two consultations:

SVP responded to the Department for Communities Equality Impact Assessment for their draft Budget. We stated our concerns about the potential impact of the proposed cuts on the households we support at SVP – stating that rather than a reduction in essential services and funding, we needed to witness investment in prevention and long term change.

Responding to the Draft Programme for Government, SVP called for addressing and eradicating poverty to be included as an explicit priority of the Government. We welcomed the publication of the Draft Programme for Government as an important milestone on the path to addressing long term problems such as poverty. We provided detailed feedback on aspects that we welcomed and were pleased to see, as well as where there could be more detail and more ambition. Finally, we called for the inclusion of specific poverty-reduction targets to ensure joined up action and prioritisation across Government.

As things stand today, Northern Ireland has neither an overall Anti-Poverty Strategy, nor a Child Poverty Strategy.² As shown above, by rising poverty rates, the need for coordinated action and a real focus on reducing poverty could not be clearer.

We hope that in 2025 the restored Executive will take a significant step forward and publish a much-needed Anti-Poverty Strategy to satisfy its obligations under the Northern Ireland Act 1998. Responding to consultation opportunities for a draft Strategy will be a key priority for the Northern Region Social Justice Group in 2025.

Calling For Change

Also in 2024, the Northern Region Social Justice Group Chair, Gerardine Cunningham, continued to call for change and represent the Social Justice aspect of the Society's Mission and Ethos.

Working for Social Justice

We are Committed to identifying the root cause of poverty and social exclusion and, in solidarity with the disadvantaged and those living in poverty, to advocate and work for the changes required to create a more just and caring society – SVP Mission



Appearing on BBC Radio Ulster in commemoration of Eradication of Poverty Day, Gerardine Cunningham, Chair of SVP Northern Region Social Justice Group, stated that child poverty was increasing due to the continuation of the two-child limit. She also stated that the five-week wait for benefits caused people to take loans during this time, which lessened their benefits amount once their payments began. Gerardine said that while inflation was reported to be reducing, this was not reflected on supermarket shelves thus making weekly shopping more expensive for people whose benefit amounts were unable to stretch that far.

Eastside Awards Recognises Gerardine Cunningham

The Annual

Gerardine Cunningham, Chair of SVP Northern Region Social Justice Group, was recognised as a finalist at the Eastside Awards for her dedication to volunteering for SVP in East Belfast.

St. Vincent de Paul Priority For Those Living in Poverty

Ahead of the General Election, St. Vincent de Paul appealed for candidates in the Northern Region to give priority to those living in poverty.

While celebrating 180 years in Ireland, SVP Regional President for the Northern Region, Mary Waide, said that in 180 years the need hasn't changed but in fact, is now greater than ever before.

Mary said: "Calls to our Regional Office doubled in 2021 and in 2022 requests for help rose by a further 50%. Last year we received around 2,000 calls per month and sadly this year we have seen a further rise. "We work throughout Northern Ireland responding to needs within local communities arising from poverty. Our requests are mainly in respect of the basics of food, gas and electricity costs. Many people rely on benefits and payment levels are painfully inadequate when considered against today's cost of living."

SVP called for an end to the five-week wait when applying for Universal Credit. When people apply for Universal Credit or have their benefits reviewed, there is a five-week assessment period.

Mary added: "St. Vincent de Paul has responded to families, often with several children, being left with nothing to live on during this five-week wait. They are offered a loan which they have to pay back once benefits commence which builds poverty into the system. SVP believes this needs to stop." SVP also called for an end to the twochild limit which creates deeper levels of child poverty, stating that:

"Feeding four children on the money for two children creates hardship for all the children in the family in terms of food, having a warm environment in the home or the capacity to thrive educationally, leading to poverty of ambition, and causes the cycle of poverty to continue into adulthood."

The charity believes that urgent work needs to be done to address the present housing shortage and to improve the standard of housing stock currently available.

"Lack of social housing stock creates the need for people to have to rent privately. Benefits, which can barely meet the food and heat requirements, have to be diverted to cover rent top ups."

Mary continued:

"SVP would ask candidates across the Region to make it their priority to address these issues, otherwise we believe that their constituents will be condemned to further poverty and injustice."







Fleur Anderson MP Visits SVP

Fleur Anderson MP, Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State at the Northern Ireland Office, requested to meet with members of SVP and volunteers of Vincent's just before Christmas.

Fleur listened intently about the invaluable work that members are engaged in throughout the Region and about some of the challenges members face on the doorstep.

Fleur browsed Vincent's on Antrim Road and congratulated the volunteers on their dedication and even enjoyed a sneak peek of the Bridal Shop.



Retail

2024 was another busy year in Retail and the Regional Retail Committee met every four to six weeks, working hard to continue to ensure that the Society's retail activities are appropriately supported and managed through adequate oversight. The Committee advises the Regional Board and Council in relation to implementation, progress, and adherence with the Current National Retail Strategy 2021–2025, and the Chair and Regional Retail Manager meet regularly with the Regional President and Regional Manager.

As chair of the committee, I am grateful for the commitment and contribution of the committee members; Mairead Taggart, Omagh; Bernie McNiece, Armagh; Eileen McKenna, Portadown; Anne Marie Hughes, Killyclogher; and Denise McAllister, Belfast. Thanks too goes to Stephen Carlin, Strabane, who just recently joined the committee. Patrick Friel, Regional Treasurer, attends all our meetings and provides advice and guidance on financial matters. The committee is indebted to our Regional Retail Manager, Anne Crossan, for her support in providing us with information on all aspects of our shops, and ensuring decisions are carried through.

In 2024 our priorities included the following:

meeting and supporting shop committees who provide the governance of the shops; a review of shop standards – are they fit for purpose, well maintained and safe for the staff, volunteers and public.

The Society is committed to ensuring efficient use of funds and in 2024 we were successful in our review of more efficient use of vans throughout the Region.

Shops have been encouraged to have clearance sales on a regular basis and find innovative ways to manage excess donations and reduce sending items to be recycled.

In 2025 we will continue to support shop Conferences in their governance roles, ensuring they have appropriate information to do so.

The Society of St. Vincent de Paul is firmly committed to ethical recycling. We appreciate the challenge our shops face in managing the volume of donations received however the challenges are now combined with the fact that worldwide recycling companies have reduced outlets for recycled clothing.



In 2025, to combat this challenge, we are introducing a campaign based on managing donations and we will also be asking for the support of the public to ensure they donate clean items in good condition and fit for resale.

We fully appreciate the contribution our shops make to the Society, in providing a service to communities and contributing financially to support the Visitation work of Conferences.
